Matthew Flinders Anglican College UQ Youth Game Changers



Summary

In 2023, the Queensland Centre for Olympic and Paralympic Studies at the University of Queensland, hosted the inaugural UQ Youth Game Changers event. This 3-day residential program for high school students was developed in collaboration with Flinders Discovery Institute at Matthew Flinders Anglican College, and the Queensland Academy of Sport. Held at UQ's St Lucia campus and the Queensland Academy of Sport, the program invested in Queensland students' capacities to inform and lead the legacies of the 2032 Brisbane Olympic and Paralympic Games.

What were the goals of the UQ Youth Game Changers?

Build Legacy Knowledges

- Understand Olympic and Paralympic Legacies and the proposed initiatives of the 2032 Games Legacy
 Plan
- Learn about the diverse people and cultures and people who will impact and be impacted by the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic games.
- Explore the processes, policies and projects that bring about change within cultures, communities, and organisations.
- Learn about factors influencing high performance sport.

Develop Leaders

- Harness personal and interpersonal skills to build an effective team that can respond to the UQ YGC challenge.
- Identify the unique role that young people play in devising and leading research, policy, and innovation strategies.
- Build own and others' problem-solving and design thinking skills to devise innovative, practical, and effective strategies.

Foster Connections

- Proactively connect with other participants, staff, and presenters to learn more about their stories and life journeys.
- Connect with leaders in research, policy, business, and sport.
- · Work with students from diverse school communities across the region

Prepare and Inspire

- Have fun be young!
- Discover what it feels like to be a tertiary student, life on campus and in a residential college.

What did the students do at UQ Youth Game Changers?

Working in teams of 8 students with 1 UQ undergraduate mentor, UQ Youth Game Changers participants will be challenged to devise a youth advocacy strategy to promote young people's engagement and leadership of the 2032 Brisbane Legacy initiatives. In the process of responding to this challenge, participants will explore the following questions:

- How can young people be inspired to drive and support the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Legacy?
- How can young people engage with research to bring about "glocal" change in their communities?
- What can young people learn from past Olympians and current researchers and innovators to inform their contributions to and leadership of a 2032 Brisbane Olympic Legacy?
- What skills do young people need to enact leadership and advocate for the change that underpins an Olympic Legacy?

The UQ Youth Game Changers Challenge

The 2023 UQ YGC Challenge called on student to collaborate with their team members and guest presenters to create a strategy that responds to the following overarching aspiration:

How can we promote young people's engagement with - and leadership of - the 2032 Games Legacy initiatives?

On Friday morning, all UQ YGC teams engaged in a 4 hour Design Sprint with Jacqui Niblett from UQ Ventures to create a UQ Youth Game Changers strategy. Teams also worked with their teachers and UQ Ventures coach to devise a pitch to present to a panel of 2032 Brisbane Legacy stakeholders. The judges awarded the winning prize to the pitch according to the three criteria:

1. Originality of the idea

- Is this a novel solution that's fit for purpose?
- Does the solution use any innovative ideas?
- Are the needs, interests and aspirations of young people a strong focus?

2. Feasibility

- Is the idea able to be created within a reasonable budget and timeframe?
- Does the required expertise exist?

3. Effectiveness of the presentation

- Is the presentation engaging and compelling?
- Would the presentation attract potential investors/buyers/end-users?

The Winning Pitch

Team #6 successfully pitched their project "Gabbification" to engage young people in the 2032 Games Legacy. This strategy involved the creation of a gaming app for young people to spread awareness on the impacts of carbon emissions on our health and in turn, our performance as athletes.

This app allows everyone to play as your own (personalised) Olympic athlete-avatar. This avatar allows you to travel as your olympic athlete and have all the responsibilities as a participating athlete; such as – travelling to your events, competing in events and choosing the most sustainable way-of-living. In the game you start at "the Olympic village" and progress through stages represented by different sporting events.

The aim of the game is to effectively finish the course with the highest score which can be achieved through placings in your sporting event and factoring your carbon emission level. You can upgrade, purchase gadgets, and even new characters. All processes go toward funding to create a more sustainable Brisbane Olympic games. Along with this 50% of all funds go to planting trees to create a greener future for not only us but our children and grandchildren.




